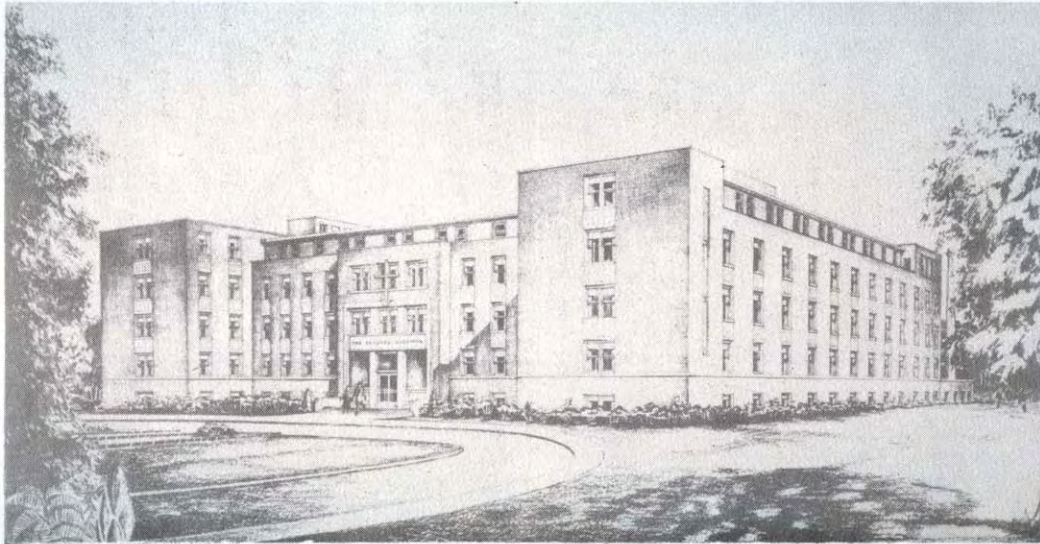

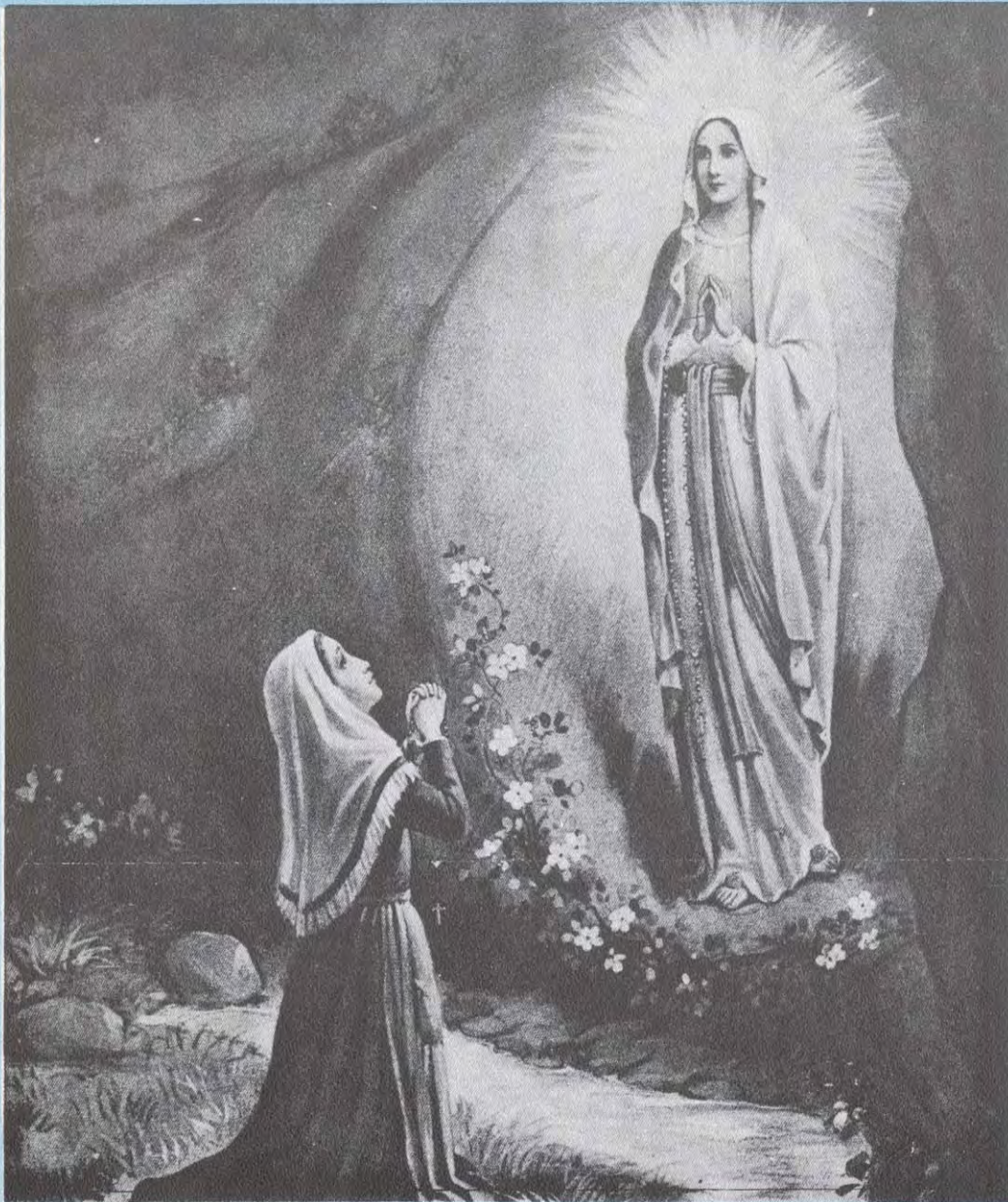


OUR PROPOSED NEW 200 BED HOSPITAL

Mother Foundress

Venerable Mother D'Youville

Mother Marguerite d'Youville, born in Varennes, Quebec, October 15, 1701, was the first Canadian Foundress of a Religious Institute in this Country, namely, The Sisters of Charity "Grey Nuns".

Her invincible trust in Divine Providence made her triumph over obstacles humanly insurmountable. Her zeal and love for the poor and all those requiring her assistance was limited only by her prudence in all that she undertook, to relieve them spiritually and materially.

In 1890, Pope Leo XIII, then gloriously reigning, honored the Servant of God with the title "Venerable". On May 3, 1955, His Holiness, Pope Pius XII declared the heroicity of her virtues calling her "Mother of Universal Charity".

It is with deep confidence that her daughters together with the people of Canada now await the successful issue of the process of Mother d'Youville's beatification.

In this year of the celebration of the diamond jubilee of the General Hospital, and of the golden jubilee of St. Mary's School of Nursing, both in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, it is fitting that on behalf of our Congregation, the Grey Sisters of the Immaculate Conception, Pembroke, Ontario, I should express my very sincere congratulations and prayerful good wishes to our devoted Sisters, to their faithful assistants, and to our loyal friends of the "Sault General Hospital" and of the "St. Mary's School of Nursing."

It was the expressed desire of the Venerable Foundress of all "Grey Nuns", Madame d'Youville, that her sisters "as servants of the poor, must be ever ready to undertake any kind of good work offered them by Divine Providence, and authorized by their superiors." Thus it was, that sixty years ago, in response to an appeal for help from Sault Ste. Marie, during an epidemic of typhoid fever, two "Grey Nuns" were sent from Ottawa to help those in need of care and attention. A small hospital was built and during the years, at various times, additions made to it until today the General Hospital of Sault Ste. Marie is a flourishing Institution equipped and furnished for hospital service for the sick and helpless of its area.

Sixty years of sacrifice entailed, of toil and difficulties encountered, discouragement and disappointments met and overcome by the pioneers of this hospital, as well as by their successors, are forgotten to-day because of the general rejoicing in the celebration of the combined diamond and golden jubilees. This is indeed a time to rejoice and thank God for His many blessings on the hospital, its staff of workers, and its many friends. This jubilee celebration may be regarded as a tribute to the faith and industry of those responsible for the past sixty years of service in this growing Institution.

May the Sault General Hospital ever continue to be a real dynamo of spiritual energy and material assistance for the personnel of the Hospital, for the Diocese in which it is located, and for the entire Church.

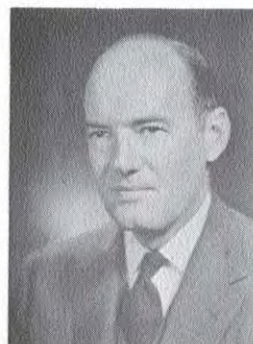

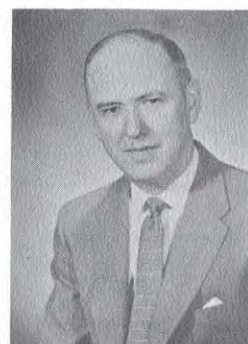

Medical Society Review

The year 1958, is a momentous one for the Sault Ste. Marie General Hospital. It marks the Sixtieth year of its operation.

This hospital, from a small beginning, has now grown to become one of the largest and best hospitals in Northern Ontario. Over the years this hospital has progressed with the times, in supplying modern diagnosis and treatment to all, who have come to it for help. The many advances, during these sixty years, in Medicine, Surgery, Chemotherapy, Anaesthesia and in the various diagnostic procedures, have all been used by the staff of the hospital, with great success, as can be vouched for, by the thousands of grateful patients who have passed through their doors.

The Sister Superior, the Administrator and Staff of Sisters have not only kept pace with all these advances in the progressive nursing care of their patients, but also, with the increasingly complicated problems of hospital management and finance.

In addition, the Grey Sisters founded the St. Mary's School of Nursing, which now marks its Fiftieth Anniversary, with the graduation exercises of student nurses who are second to none in their nursing skill and qualification.

The Medical Staff in co-operation with the Board of Directors, have endeavoured to provide skillful and safe medical care, and have set up various committees to further this aim. A Tissue Committee scrutinizes each pathological specimen secured at operation; a Record Committee sees that all charts and forms are accurately completed, and a Credential Committee examines the records and diplomas of all new doctors to determine their proficiency and skill. Other committees function in a similar fashion to insure that all the staff work together in harmony, for the common good. As a result of these measures, the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals of the United States and Canada have given full accreditation to the General Hospital; also, the American Hospital Association has endowed it with all the rights, benefits and privileges of an "Active" Institutional Member in the American Hospital Association.

May the splendid spirit of co-operation and progress which has resulted in this warm and friendly hospital, be perpetuated, so that future generations will continue to reap the benefits and to bless the spirit that motivated the founding of the Genral Hospital Sixty Years ago.

PROGRESS THROUGH THE YEARS *of the GENERAL HOSPITAL*

A Big Business - the Business of Human Life

- 1898 — The General Hospital was erected as a result of a typhoid epidemic in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. The Grey Nuns of the Cross, Ottawa, accepted an invitation to take over the direction of this hospital, arriving here on September 13, 1898, and taking up temporary quarters on Bay Street. On September 21, 1898, the cornerstone of the present building was laid.
- 1926 — The buildings and property of the General Hospital were transferred from the Grey Nuns of the Cross to the Grey Sisters of the Immaculate Conception, Pembroke, Ontario — a newly formed English-Speaking community of Grey Sisters, with the agreement that the latter assume a mortgage and debt of approximately, \$80,000.00.
- Sister Mary Dorothea, a member of the O'Driscoll family in the Sault, took over the position of Superior and was assisted by Sisters St. Edith, St. Patricia and Margaret Mary.
- Doctors on the Staff at that time were: Doctors McLean, McRae, McCaig, Fleming, Keith, Gimby, Sr., Gimby, Jr., Shepard, Duncan, Sinclair, Hamilton, Desorcy, Leahy, Lane, Cain, Casselman, Lloyd, Lowe and Spratt.
- Since 1926, this hospital has accommodated the Rotary Crippled Children's Clinic annually, and held provincial chest clinics for many years from 1927.
- 1930 — A new elevator was installed.
- 1935 — For the first time, the hospital became fully approved by the American College of Surgeons.
- 1937 — The Iron Lung, a gift of the Ontario Government to the Kiwanis Club, was provided.
- 1943 — The X-Ray Department was brought completely up-to-date with modern equipment.
- 1947 — The Chapel, on the second floor, was remodelled in its entire section, with exceptional taste in its beautiful furnishings. The Operating Room unit and the Men's Floor were also redecorated.
- 1949 — An Admission Chest X-Ray machine was installed in the admitting office, by the Ontario Department of Health, at the instigation of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association and the Sault Lions Club. A patient, who was admitted for a fractured jaw, turned out to be the first active case of tuberculosis detected in this manner.
- 1951 — Drawing up of the blueprints for the laundry, power plant and new pavilion began. The architect was Harold J. Smith, M.R.A.I.C., of Toronto, Ontario.



- 1952 — A residence for Student Nurses was purchased on Kohler Street, (formerly Van Every Residence) in order to cope with the number of students registered that year. It was given the name Marian Residence.
- 1953 — The General Hospital Fund Committee launched a campaign for funds in order to expand its facilities and meet with the critical bed situation. Throughout the years various additions and renovations were made without public campaign for assistance except in the year 1923, when funds were raised for a nurses' residence. The new construction program now under way was to more than double the capacity of the hospital, with almost the whole of the expansion being devoted to adding patient beds. The appeal was set at \$75,000.00. The chairman of the campaign, Mr. F. E. (Lynn) Hollingsworth, and his able workers, raised funds in the amount of \$100,896.00 — a response from the people of this community that was most gratifying.

The Hospitals Assistance Corporation of Sault Ste. Marie assisted generously in this cause.

- 1954 — On October 28, 1954, the opening of the New Pavilion took place. This first wing of a proposed new 200-bed hospital offered an additional 87 adult beds and 26 bassinets; it is linked with the present 112-bed capacity hospital by exposed red brick passageways. Modernity, efficiency, comfort and Northern birch wooden furnishings throughout are among its many striking features.
- 1956 — An Emergency Unit was opened near the ambulance entrance.
- 1957 — In August of this year, an additional residence (formerly Pratt Residence) was purchased for Student Nurses, and became known as the Marguerite d'Youville Residence.

In September, the Commencement Exercises were held. In addition to the Nurses' Graduation, it was the first public graduation for a student in the School of X-Ray Technology.

In November, a certified Pathologist, Dr. F. P. Sparks, became a member of our staff; and this Department of Laboratory and Pathology, on the third floor of the hospital, was brought completely up-to-date.

- 1958 — A third operating theatre was built in the Surgery unit.

With 60 years of dedicated service to the community of Sault Ste. Marie and surrounding district, your General Hospital celebrates its DIAMOND JUBILEE.

It was a happy venture to pour over the annals of the past during the early months of this year. Many names of friends and benefactors were again brought to light, but to try to record them and the various organizations who have helped us in furnishing equipment and in giving other assistance would be almost impossible and the risk to omit even one name be too great. You know who you are . . . we know who you are . . . but, most of all, God knows who you are!

My readings brought tears, laughs and smiles as I reviewed interesting accounts of days gone by. Many of you are still with us, but many too have gone to their reward. Their deeds are recorded on faded pages of the hospital, but what is more important, they are recorded in glittering letters in the annals of heaven.

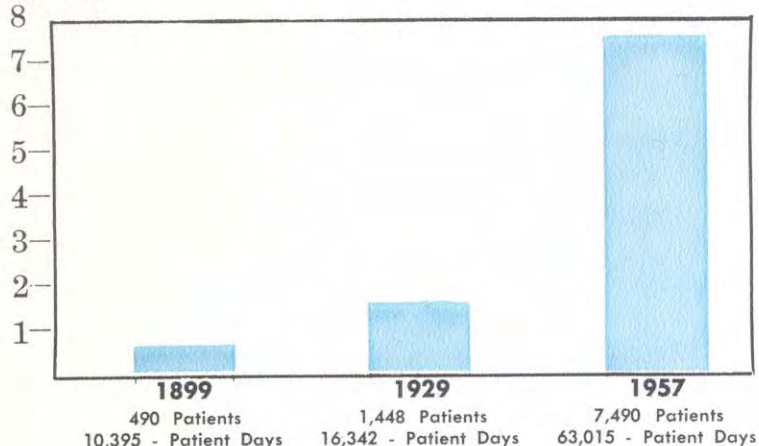

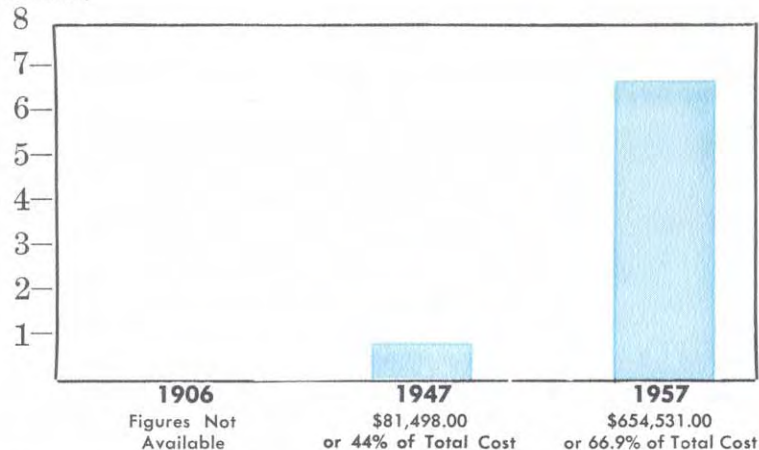
THIS IS GROWTH IN PATIENTS AND IN PATIENT DAYS

(in Thousands)



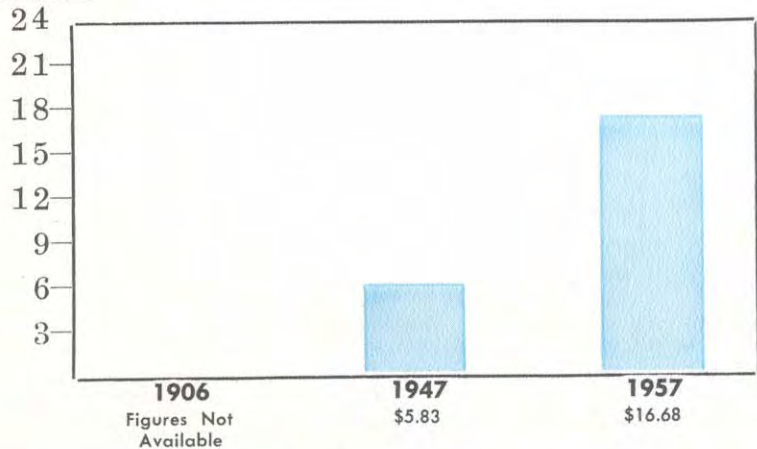
THIS IS GROWTH IN GROSS SALARIES AND WAGES

Thousands)



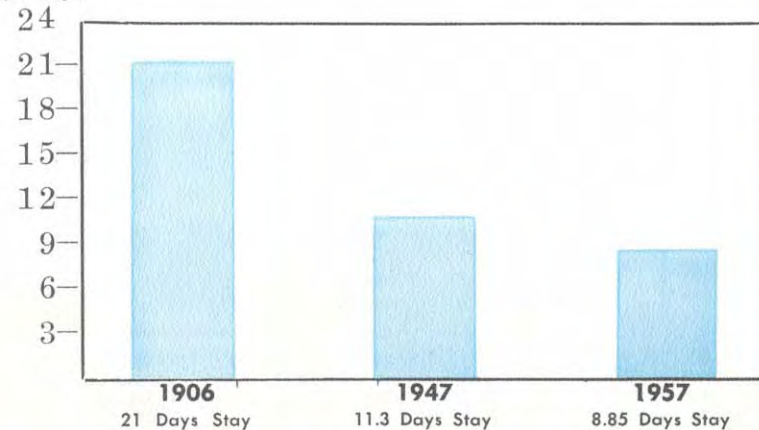
THIS IS INCREASE IN THE COST PER DAY OF EACH PATIENT

(in days)





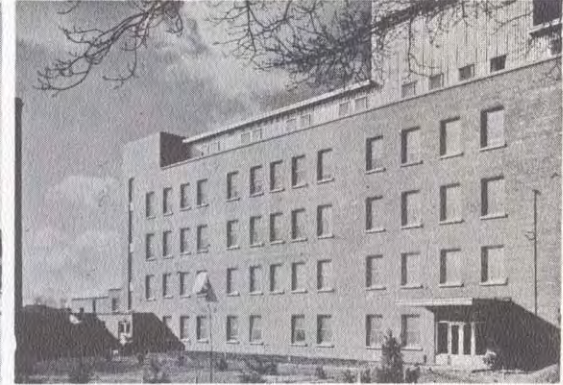

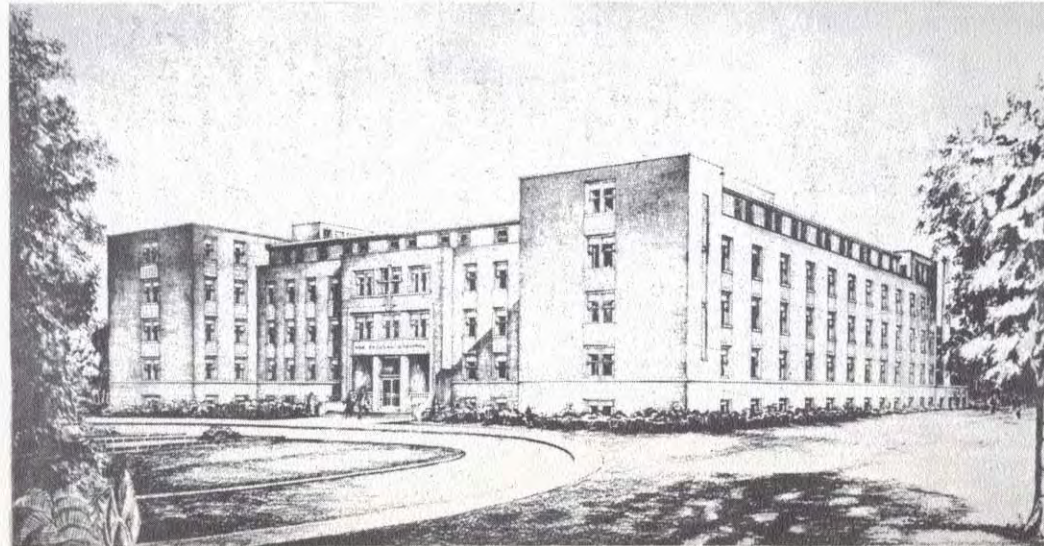
