

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In 2011, St. Joseph's School of Nursing Alumnae Association celebrated the 100th year of the founding and opening of St. Joseph's School of Nursing by initiating and participating in many events.

We began the year by printing a Pictorial Commemorative Calendar for all Alumnae Members that highlighted the Sisters, student nurses, graduate nurses, instructors and support staff from the years 1911 to 1978.

On Sunday, March 27, thirty-one Alumnae members entered in the Around the Bay Road Race, an annual event that raises money for St. Joseph's Healthcare. As student nurses we always went that extra mile for St. Joe's, so it only seemed natural that as graduates commemorating the opening of our school 100 years ago, we again would go that extra mile (5K or 30 K) for St. Joe's.

Monday May 9, we were invited by Heather Hoxby, Director of Nursing to participate in the Nursing Grand Rounds in the St. Joe's Tower. An archival power point presentation was set up and displayed by Janina Berenyi '65 and Bev Greenwood '70. Refreshments and a St. Joseph's School of Nursing Cake were provided in our honour.

On Tuesday May 10, Winnie Doyle, Chief Nursing Executive invited the Alumnae Executive to attend the Nurses Award Banquet. In recognition of our 100th anniversary, we were presented with a plaque honouring our legacy to the nursing profession, signed by Kevin Smith C.E.O. of St. Joseph's Healthcare and Winnie Doyle.

Friday May 27th, our Annual Reunion Day began with a Reunion Day Mass with Bishop Douglas Crosby, Bishop of Hamilton, as the main celebrant. The official greeter for this Mass was Sister Virginia Hanlon '45.

Our Reunion Day Dinner was attended by 460 Alumnae Members. An Artists Corner, the Raffle Table, the 50/50 Table and the Calendar Table were a hub of activity. Janine Berenyi and Bev Greenwood had their Archival Power Point Presentation prominently displayed on the front screen much to the delight of all in attendance. Chief Nursing Executive of St. Joe's Winnie Doyle, brought greetings from the hospital. Janine Belzak, Special Events Coordinator of St. Joseph's Foundation awarded the thirty-one Around the Bay Road Race Participants with prizes won for outstanding efforts.

Saturday May 28th, Sister Virginia, Sister Ann Marshall and Sister Joan O'Sullivan hosted a Tea and Tour for Alumnae Members at St. Joseph's Convent, Hamilton. Again, the Archival Power Point Presentation was displayed along with many year books, photos and historical paraphernalia. Refreshments were served to over 200 participants. The four living Directors of Nursing were in attendance: Sister Virginia Hanlon, Sister Joan O'Sullivan, Sister Ann Marshall and Mrs. Virginia Frere.

On September 8th 2011, St. Joseph's Healthcare hosted a tea to commemorate the exact day, September 8, 1911, the official opening of St. Joseph's School of Nursing. Winnie Doyle, Chief Nursing Executive of St. Joe's presented and dedicated a painting by Carolyn Dover to all nurses who have graduated and worked at St. Joseph's since the founding of the School of Nursing.

Good Morning,

My name is Sister Virginia Hanlon, Class of 1945. On behalf of the Sisters of St. Joseph, I am honoured and privileged to welcome Bishop Crosby, Bishop of Hamilton, Alumnae and friends to this wonderful celebration - the 100th Anniversary of St. Joseph's School of Nursing, Hamilton. We have a great history and all of us have played a vital role in it.

Our story began in 1852 when three Sisters of St. Joseph came to Hamilton - with no idea of what the future held. During the first few years the Sisters cared for immigrants who were arriving by ship in the hundreds.

The Sisters were very involved with victims of the cholera and typhoid epidemics. The epidemic struck in the hot, dry summer of 1854, during which hundreds of people died.

Some years later, in response to the doctors and citizens of Hamilton, the Sisters became formally involved in healthcare with the opening of St. Joseph's Hospital on June 11th 1890 with 25 beds. In the beginning the Sisters alone provided all the care required by the patients. As the number of people requiring care continued to increase, the Sisters recognized the need to have additional staff if the hospital was to meet the growing demand.

So it was on September 8th 1911, that St. Joseph's School of Nursing began its proud tradition, which continues to this day.

Following graduation, some of you returned to work at our hospital and helped it to become a world-class university affiliated teaching hospital and a centre of excellence.


Many of you continued to work in other hospitals, in public health, industrial nursing, in nursing education, research and helping the poor in the third world countries.

We are all a part of that great history and we gather here today with joy and gratitude to God for the legacy that we received and passed on to others remembering our motto:



TOAST TO THE ALMA MATER KATHY FARRELL RENWICK CLASS 1961

Thank you for the honour of addressing the Alumnae on behalf of the Class of 1961 on the occasion of our 50th reunion from nursing at St. Joseph's Hospital Hamilton Ontario. Well, Ladies, we made it to 50 years. You know it was exactly 50 years ago May 25th that the Class of '61 was sitting in the Auditorium of Cathedral Girls High School listening to the many speeches wishing us well and preparing us to leave the protection of St. Joe's, our Alma Mater to head out in the big wide world and make our way as newly graduated nurses.

So tonight I'd like you to indulge me while I briefly travel back to the year 1961 and to our training days. So many memories come flooding back, and thanks goodness long term memories are still the easiest to access. Some of the catch phrases of the early 60's were words like "cool" and "groovy", but there were a couple of phrases that stayed with me throughout my 3 years of training that did not originate in the popular culture.

The first one was actually the creation of the late great Katie Farrell my mother, on the occasion of my sister Mary (Class of 1960) departure for St. Joe's to start training. Mary and I were having a fight (not an unusual occurrence for us of course) and our mother found it necessary to intervene. When Mary responded with the sarcastic attitude of a normal 17 year old and said "I'm sorry" Katie responded with "just remember young lady you can't say I'm sorry to the coroner."

The next expression that stayed with me for the 3 years originated with Sr. Virginia and that was "don't forget that the door that let you in will let you out."

Some of the popular music of 1961 surprisingly seemed to address what we were experiencing as we prepared to leave the protection of our nursing school and head out into the big wide world. Some of the billboard hits seemed somehow relevant as we got ready to leave residence life forever:

Etta James hit "At Last" ...and I know so many shared that sentiment at the time.

Elvis Presley's "It's Now or Never"...as we faced the reality that we had no choice, so it's best to get on with it.

Roy Orbison's "Running Scared"...weren't we all as we faced going out into the world on our own?

Ray Charles "Hit the Road Jack" ... I'm sure this reflected the sentiment of the Sisters of St. Joseph and all the support staff who helped prepare us to leave the nest and be out on our own and make room for the next class coming in.

Del Shannon's "Runaway"....who can forget the group of classmates who went home after graduation, worked non-stop, saved their money and then took off for an adventure travelling through Europe?

Chris Kenner's "I Like It Like That"....and wasn't that the way so many of us felt when we set ourselves up in our first apartments on our own?

Chubby Checkers "Let's Twist Again" ... I remember the challenge of learning to do "The Twist" and then dancing the twist at every party I went to in Montreal the following year.

I remember the fun we had in residence and the many ways we learned to cope with the restrictions of residence living. The curfews when you worked the day shift, and the sleep deprivation when you worked the afternoon or night shifts. We all somehow found ways to cope, including occasional finding ways escaping residence after curfew.

I do recall how blessed hot it was in Hamilton in the summer and how grateful we were that we had cotton summer white uniforms that made the heat slightly more bearable when we were working. Of course for my money, the preferred shift in the summertime was the night shift because we could take the bus to Van Wagner's Beach in Burlington and sun bathe and sleep for 4 to 5 hours a day on the beach. This necessitated going to the beach in a group with our alarm clocks set for every half hour so we could turn over and re-apply more baby oil with iodine to help the tanning process. The downside of our sunbathing expeditions of course was coming home on the bus, exhausted, hot, sunburned and itching all over from the sand. But after a cool bath in residence, our beds never felt more cool or comfortable in those hot summer days.

Some of the other coping methods I remember were the emergency runs in our pyjamas with the legs rolled up and covered by a trench coat, down John St. to Bill's doughnuts for those delicious chocolate glazed doughnuts that fuelled many a bridge game in Undermount's T.V. room. If you had the money, you made a trip to the Chicken Roost Restaurant for the delicious ice cream puffs with hot fudge sauce.

Other fun diversions were parties at the Cawesco Club, dinners at Ann Waldron's and Julie Capriotti's homes where their mothers made fabulous home cooked meals. When Ann could get her mother's car for an evening, who could forget the pizza runs she made to the Trocadero with orders for half the residence.

I remember the allowances we got each month...\$9.00 the first year, \$12.00 the second year and \$15.00 the third year. A pack of cigarettes cost 35 cents to 55 cents a pack so our allowance helped all the smokers keep themselves stocked.

Looking back to 1961, I found the following document sharing some of the popular concerns of the time: if things keep going the way they are it's going to be impossible to buy a week's groceries for \$10.00 or it won't be long before \$1,000.00 will only buy a used car. When I started driving, who would have thought gas would someday cost 31 cents a gallon? And we thought that \$16,500.00 for a house was only for the wealthy.

My first salary after I became registered was \$325.00 a month. It was to go up to \$350.00 a month but I was already working at Montreal General. Our salary there was \$250.00 a month and it was paid out monthly not bi-weekly. Trying to live on that in Montreal in 1962 was almost impossible.

In closing, I'd like to offer the following:

To my fellow classmates from St. Josephs Class of 1961, congratulations for the many years of dedicated nursing service.

To the Sisters of St. Joseph, thank you for the care, the leadership and the heart-felt compassion you demonstrated to us, and for the confidence and competence you instilled in us to prepare us to be effective members of our noble profession. Thanks to you, we were able to take these qualities and abilities into our places of service in the nursing profession in our various communities both in Canada and around the world.

To the Alumnae we thank you for your leadership, strength, affirmation and education to all of us in support of our Alma Mater.

We also remember and honour our eleven classmates who have departed this life and ask that their nursing legacy and spirit continue through the rest of us.

We want to acknowledge with gratitude the extraordinary efforts of our classmate Barbara Warren Wright for organizing our Alumnae class reunions through the years. We are grateful for her leadership, steadfast dedication and record keeping on behalf of her classmates.

We give thanks for our family and friends who have affirmed and supported us throughout our professional work-lives. Bless our profession and all nurses who face the new challenges, new possibilities and new promises in healthcare and in our nursing profession.

We also pray for Gods blessing for the next stage of our lives into the future with soft breezes if anger comes, gentle rains if sadness comes, a shining moon if hope dims, and warm and loving smiles if harshness comes.

Always remember there is no beginning or end: yesterday is history; tomorrow is a mystery; today is a gift.

Finally, bless us with a life rooted in love for our nursing profession, our friends, our families and each other. It's been a great ride so far and I can hardly wait to see what it's like at our 60th reunion.



Address by Sister Ann Marshall

Good Afternoon Dr. Kevin Smith, Dr. Higgins, Nursing Colleagues, friends and supporters of nurses everywhere. It is a privilege to speak on behalf of the Sisters of St. Joseph who have served the sick in St. Joseph's Hospital for 121 uninterrupted years in many capacities of caring and compassion, and today in the persons of Sisters Patricia and Giovanni.

Our founding motto "It is an honour to serve the sick" now embraces the wider community, and continues to be the guiding force of this ministry which began with a modest 25 beds, a few committed Sisters and hearts full of common sense. It would be many years before Sisters would go to the U.S.A. to train as nurses.

Multi tasking seems to be in the D.N.A. of women, and sisters are no exception. Sister Virginia was the Director of the School of Nursing in the sixties as well as the Sister supervising the construction of the Nurses' school and residence, Fontbonne Hall, which today houses Doctor's offices and clinics. At that period in our history, the Hospital had a Night Supervisor; should the Supervisor need to consult with administration in the early hours of the morning, it was the Sister in the School of Nursing who got the wake up call.

It was also during the sixties that Sister Mary Grace, Reg.N. and C.E.O., along with the day to day operation of a 500 bed teaching hospital, was also responsible for the construction of the 8 story Friesen Surgical building. Health care was rapidly expanding and the need for medical education and research was the impetus for Sister Mary Grace to hire the first Medical Director, Dr. Ken Williams.

Sister Joan O'Sullivan, our last Sister CEO, sponsor and Honourary Captain of the In-house hockey team, appropriately named Joan's Jets, oversaw the construction of this magnificent Juravinski medical tower. But Sister Joan also saw beyond Hamilton, and even Canada, the serious unaddressed health needs in poorer parts of the world and responded with the International Out Reach Program that caught fire in the heart and lives of our colleagues in our four institutions.

As we celebrate our 100th anniversary, we acknowledge the vast contributions of all levels of Health Professionals and support staff and the dedicated Board of Trustees who have worked along side us in good and not so good times to realize the dream of a world class health, teaching and research centre of which we are so proud.

But today we especially recognize our graduates who are a special breed of whom we are so proud. How many schools of nursing have vibrant fully functioning alumnae 33 years following the transfer of the Nursing program to a Community College? These graduates may be found working at the bedside from the O.R. to the rehabilitation ward and points in between as nurses, medical doctors, teachers in the profession, specialists in their field, serving in overseas developing countries, and administrators in related health institutions, with a single goal in mind: compassionate care of the sick and dying and their loved ones.

Today the Sister's salute you, our graduates, for the reputation that St. Joseph's enjoys today, and thank you for helping to make the world a kinder and safer place in which to live.

The painting by Carolyn Dover depicts the rich soil and farmland of the golden horseshoe. The legacy of our Alumnae has produced rich soil. We have an obligation to nourish that soil and ensure we grow an ongoing legacy of nursing here at St Joe's that reflects the passion, wisdom and readiness to overcome challenges in caring. This is characteristic of our nursing history. I believe that the legacy of those of us practicing today will be more powerful if we cultivate the fellowship, friendship and comradery, that so typified the Nurses in St, Joseph's School of Nursing. This spirit amongst nurses will energize us to produce our best. On behalf of the 1800 nurses now working at St. Joe's, thank you!"
