Official Opening March 8, 1995

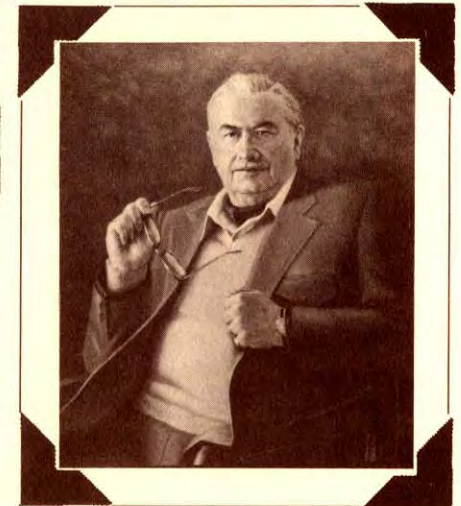

Le Royer Patrons

A Patron is an individual who has entered into a formal relationship with Hotel Dieu Hospital. The name Le Royer originates from the congregation's founder, Jerome le Royer de la Dauversiere, who was born in France in 1597. As a lay person, fund raiser and political and social activist, he serves now as a role model for those who wish to support the Sisters' mission and philosophy and who value the presence of Catholic health care today.

The Board of Directors of Hotel Dieu Hospital established Le Royer Circle in 1981, to which retiring Trustees were appointed. This appointment honoured their contributions to the Hospital and created a formal liaison permitting the Board to draw upon their talents for any future purpose. Subsequently, in 1985, by-law revisions changed Le Royer Circle into the Special Resources Committee of the Board of Directors to enable retired trustees and other interested friends of the Hospital to be involved in the organization. Members became known as Patrons.

As volunteers, Patrons serve the hospital in a variety of ways. They may be appointed by the Sisters to serve on Board committees. Some may be called upon to act as consultants, while others might assist with special projects, for example, a fund raising event. Those who are unable to make such commitments support the Hospital

through acts of good will in the community. Patrons represent the public which the hospital serves and, in so doing, become a powerful voice conveying community needs while providing service to this institution. This relationship is, indeed, both reciprocal and valuable.

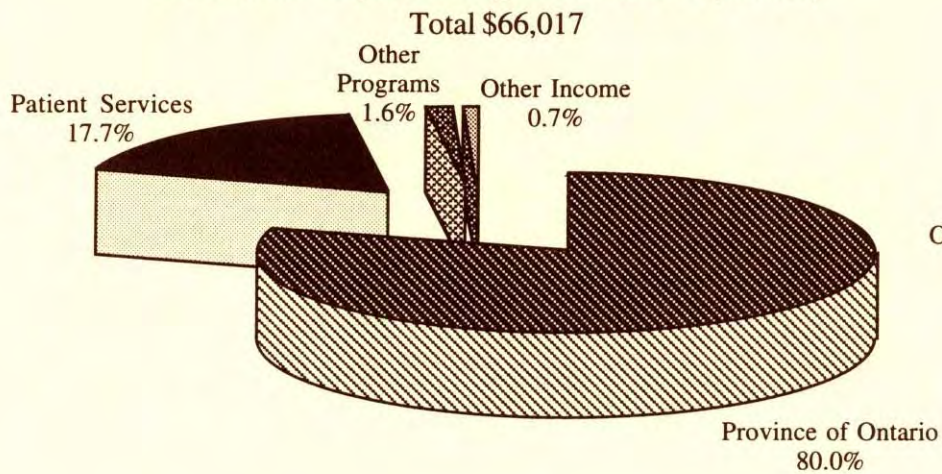

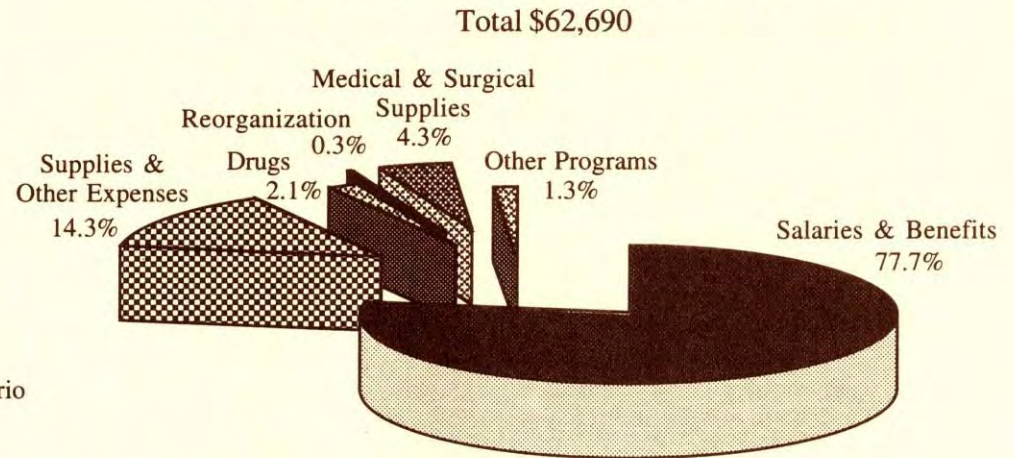

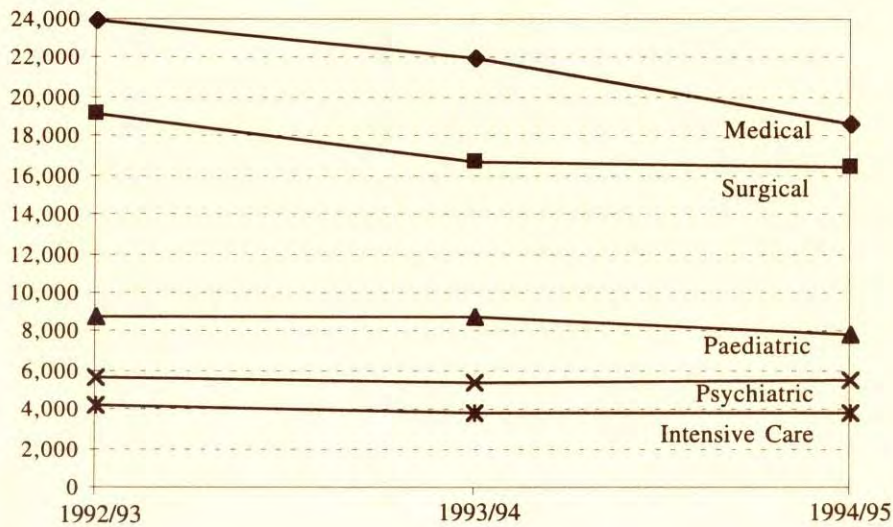
1994/95 Operating Revenue (000s)



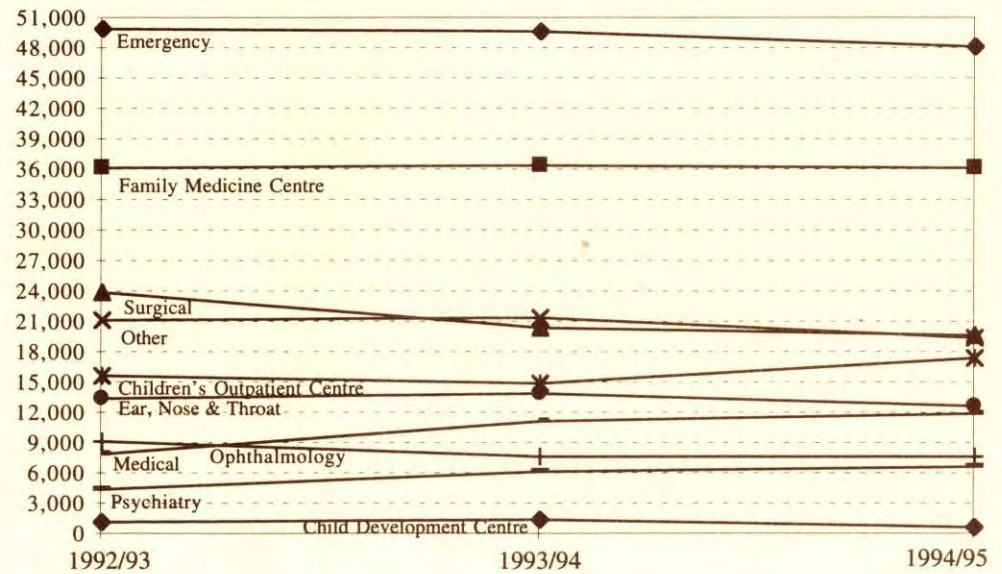
1994/95 Operating Expenses (000s)

The Foundation is named after Jeanne Mance, who was the first lay nurse of North America. A native of France, she and Maisonneuve, the Governor of New France, founded Montreal in 1642. Jeanne Mance established a hospital in the same year to bring care to settlers and native people. Three Religious Hospitaliers fulfilled their founder's vision when they arrived in Montreal to help Jeanne cope with the increasing demands for health care. While the

Sisters nursed the sick and injured, Jeanne remained in charge of the finances and administration until her death in 1673.

The Jeanne Mance Foundation of Kingston was established in 1981 to receive and manage funds to benefit Hotel Dieu Hospital.

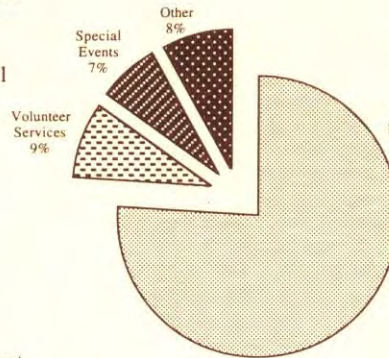

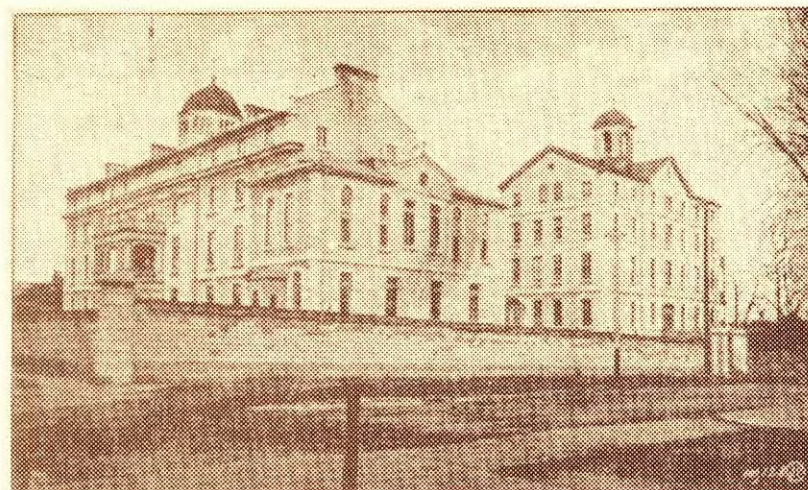

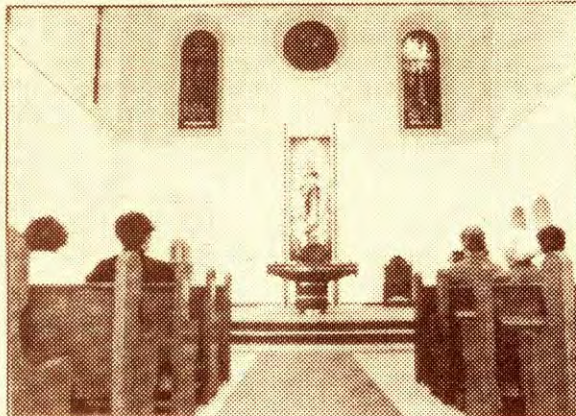

The chapel — the heart of Hotel Dieu Hospital

Although the sisters were able to squeeze a tiny chapel into the first building to house Hotel Dieu, the first large hospital in the old Begiopolis College building lacked one. That was soon rectified. On May 20, 1894 Archbishop Cleary laid the cornerstone of a new chapel of St. Joseph, where the first mass was celebrated on March 1, 1895.

Donations helped furnish the chapel — altar, sanctuary lamp, paintings for the Stations of the Cross, the sanctuary carpet and an electric chandelier. In 1904, the stained glass windows were installed.

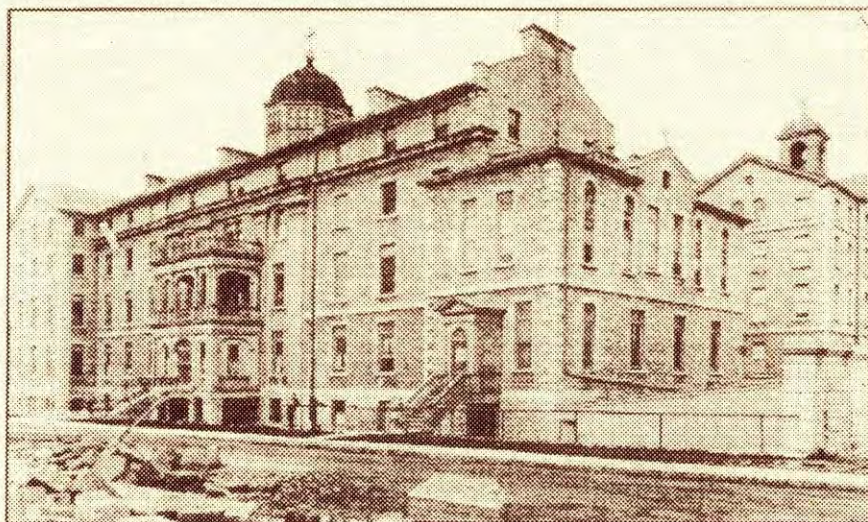

HISTORY IS ALIVE! ALL AROUND US, although we don't think of it as history, but as the unfolding stories of our everyday lives. From time to time, these stories are collected, not by professional historians but by those who think special people and events are worth remembering.

From wants to living a flow is the title of the most recent of these local histories of the Kingston area. The modest, spirit-bound book contains "the history of 50 years of dedicated service of the Volunteer Services to Hotel Dieu Hospital," as the subtitle explains.

The book is a fascinating read, and a testimony to what generous people can accomplish for their community. Since its founding 50 years ago as the Hotel Dieu Ladies' Auxiliary, volunteers have raised almost \$2 million for the hospital. This year, as Hotel Dieu celebrates its 150th anniversary, some 375 people will contribute 30,000 hours of volunteer service.

Every one of these people gives living proof to the book's title. Each of these women and men have gone beyond saying they want to do something to help and have performed some "loving action" at the hospital.

HOTEL DIEU HIGHLIGHTS

Founding sister was multi-talented

Hotel Dieu is the creation of a small group of dedicated women, from the days of the foundress and first Superior, Sister Amable Bourbonniere. She arrived in Kingston on May 27, 1845, accompanied by three other sisters, to open the tiny new hospital. Sister Bourbonniere found herself not only Superior but novice mistress, pharmacienne and treasurer. During the 1847 typhus epidemic she accompanied one of the sisters daily to minister to the sick in the hastily-erected immigrant sheds; and on Christmas Day 1847 found herself in charge of almost 100 orphan children. She also won renown in the sisters' annals for her ointments for treating skin ailments. She remained as Superior until 1848, and died in Montreal on March 18, 1855, at the age of 62.

Board of directors plays key role in the running of hospital

Like any large organization, Hotel Dieu hospital is guided in part by its board of directors. The board was established in 1951 to advise the hospital in administration matters and in the conduct of its public relations. It is composed primarily of lay members, and reports to the Religious Hospitalliers of St. Joseph, who own the hospital.

The board must ensure that quality care of the whole patient, including spiritual, is provided with competence and compassion, and without discrimination. The good stewardship of the personnel, financial, material and spiritual resources is also their responsibility. They review the annual capital and operating budgets and see that the hospital is managed within its budgets.

The board conducts an annual review

provide operating funds, but to meet equipment needs, Hotel Dieu must institute fund-raising appeals.

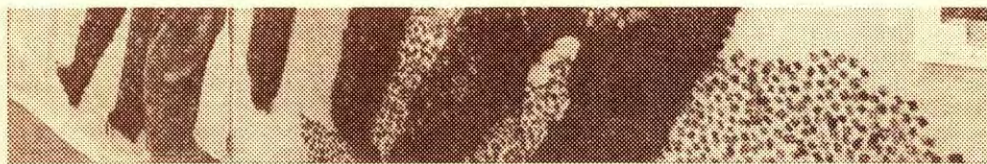
In 1961, the Jeanne Mance Foundation was established, initially to help meet equipment needs for the new Jeanne Mance wing. The foundation manages the funds generated by major fund-raising appeals, as well as donations and bequests.

The same year, then board chair Isabel Paldi, only the second woman to serve as chair, urged the formation of the Le Royer Circle to which retiring trustees were appointed.

"There were retired members who were still willing and wanted to be involved. The intent was that they would not be involved in daily operations, but could assist in many other areas, especially in fund raising," she said.

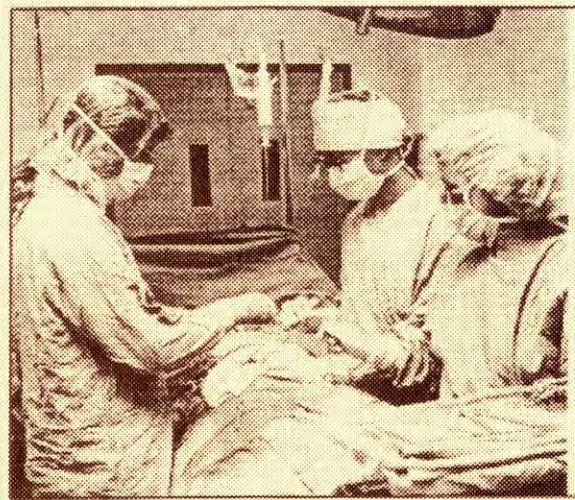
