SISTER MARY FELICITAS

After spending several years in Peterborough, Sister Felicitas became this school's first Director of Nursing, in 1931. She began with three first year students and was solely responsible for education for ten years. During the last five years as director, she was assisted by two lay teachers.

From 1931 to 1946, Sister was also the Director of Nursing for the hospital, and was responsible for all nursing personnel. There were no organized services at that time; therefore, Sister assumed responsibility for several other positions. During periods of illness, she was known to function from her hospital bed.

Sister has been described as being understanding and fair in treating all her students as individuals. She was never too busy to listen to her students.

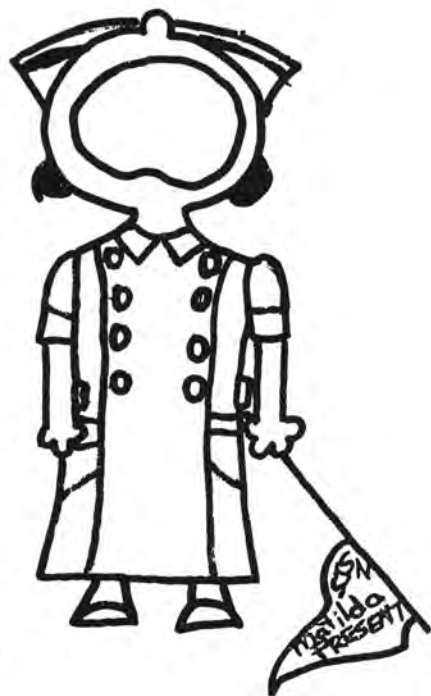
Sister Felicitas was very easily respected and those who knew her will always remember her as being a real Lady.

Because of the drastic need for medical services in the north, the Sisters of St. Joseph founded St. Joseph's General Hospital in October of 1931 with Mother St. Philip the administrator.



THE SEED

What is it that lends charm with individuality to any hospital? It is the school of nursing. Three students in their intermediate year were brought to North Bay to continue their nursing education. Nine more were accepted to begin their third year training under the direction of Sister Felicitas. The student was an apprentice and she learned from the people with whom she worked.

WAS SOWN



Priest Hill, 1903, showing "Little Red School House"

The present 500 wing served as the first residence until 1938 when the little red school house was turned into a residence. In 1942, a fire left only a few bricks standing. In 1943 the residence was repaired and a complete new floor added to accommodate the needs of a growing school.



AND THE FIRST



The first young students would have been a little shocked at the short sleeves of today's uniform, because short sleeves were considered unprofessional. Her uniform consisted of a blue-striped long-sleeved dress, white shoes and stockings, bib and apron.

Caps were received after six months of the first year. No band appeared until the senior year during which a black band was worn. In 1946 caps with coloured bands and short-sleeved uniforms appeared.

APPEARED**



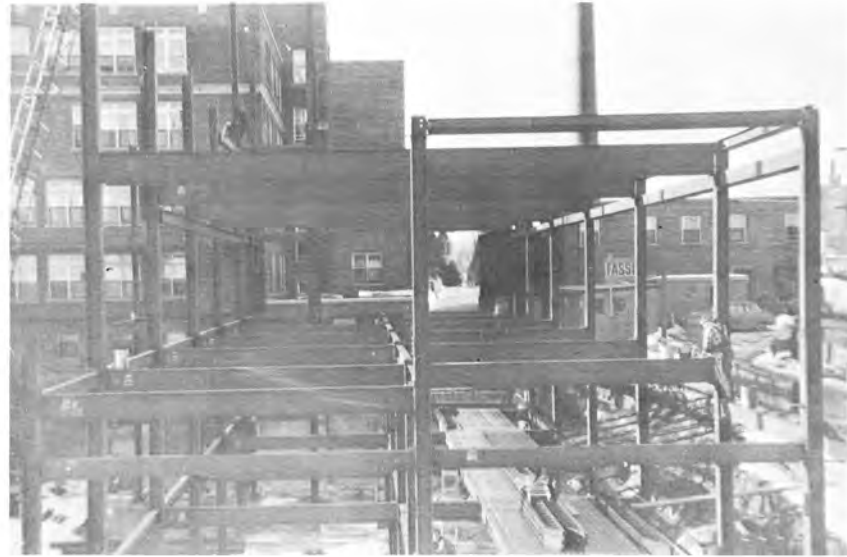
An important addition to the school was the establishment of the library in 1949 containing both nursing and recreational books. The library has been steadily increasing, and the latest nursing material is available for the students' study and research.



THE STALK



After hospital renovations in 1948 to increase the bed capacity to 150, it was necessary in 1957 to expand once again, increasing the number of bed units to 217 plus bassinets. This also made available other hospital facilities. Not only was the new wing added, but the older part of the hospital was given a "new look". All this allowed for more areas of experience for the students.



BEGAN^T TO GROW



Then in 1964, bibs and aprons disappeared, replaced by a blue uniform with white collar and cuffs. Not to be outdone, our Sisters of St. Joseph recently revised the style of their habits.



TWE

FIRST



With growth came many changes. Classes became discussion periods, and the school became involved with many areas such as Casselholme. Curriculum was overhauled and many innovations were instituted.



BUD APPEARED



The O.R. term, completed in the junior year, was decreased to four weeks, and students only work a 35 hour week, at either St. Joseph's or Civic Hospitals.

Married students were accepted into all three classes. Students branched their search for knowledge into the community. Nursing became a "personal response to the health needs of the individual". The girls were proud to become nursing students not student nurses.



AND



Students anxious to learn, planned trips to Toronto and Ottawa, attended a Workshop on team nursing and made plans for a yearly year-book.

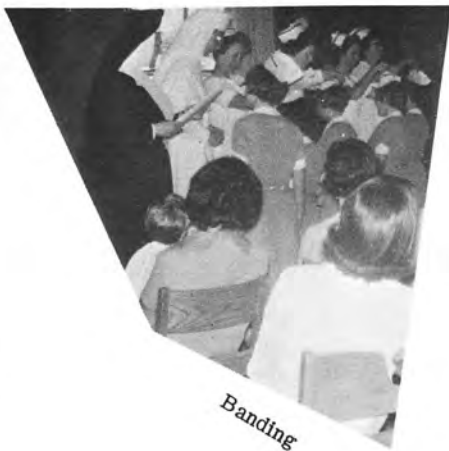

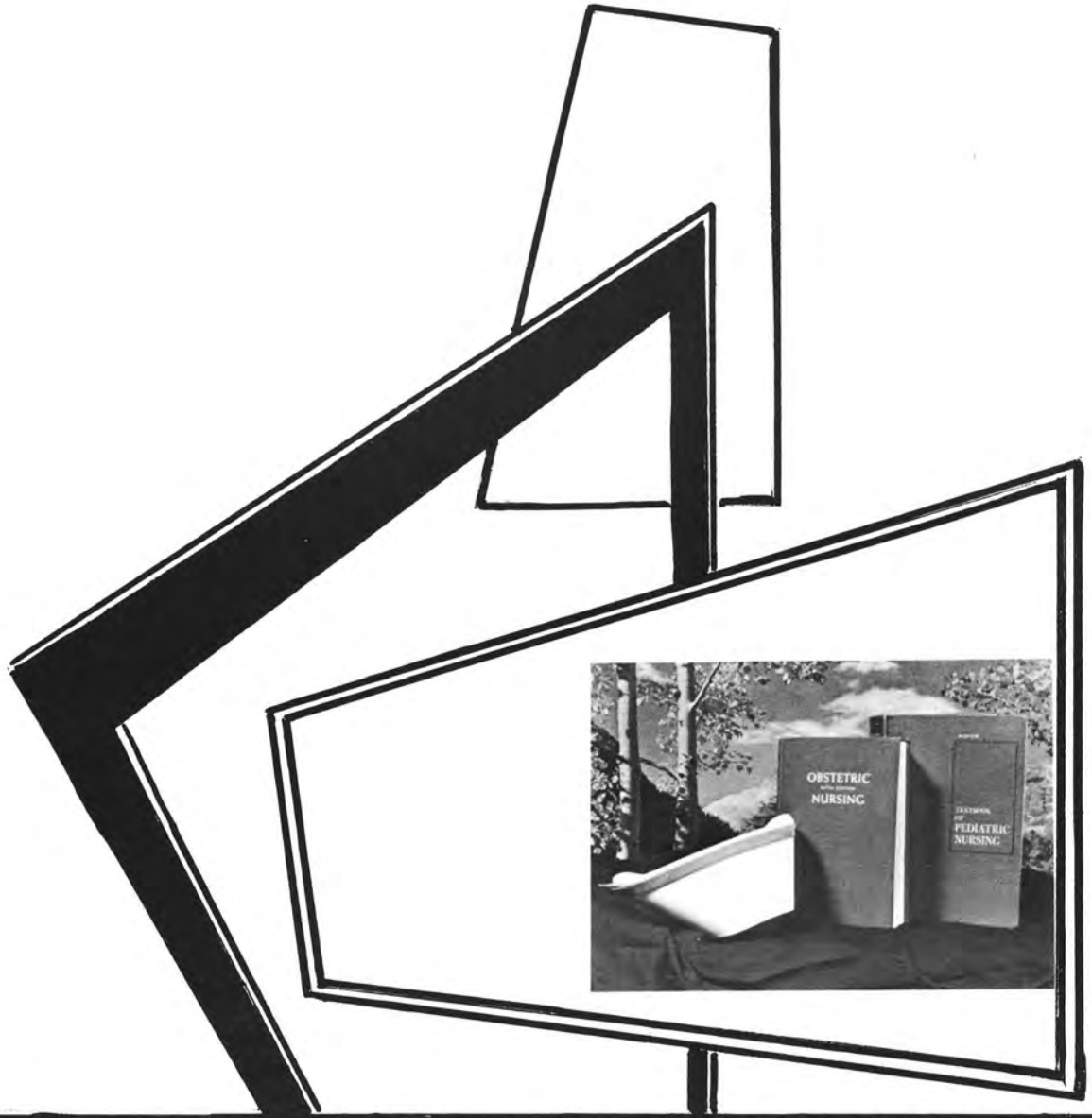

Dag Hammarskjöld, in his diary "Markings", left us the legacy of his thoughts. In his words:



*"I am being driven forward
Into an unknown land.
The pass grows steeper,
The air colder and sharper.
A wind from my unknown goal
Stirs the strings
Of expectation.*

*Still the question:
Shall I ever get there?
There where life resounds
A clear pure note
In the silence."*

Finally, we are Seniors. Our caps are now graced with bright yellow bands. Class time is limited to one day every second week and we gain much valuable practical experience on all units. We are at last beginning to feel like functioning members of the health team. The winds are favorable, our sails billow and our vessel picks up speed as we sight land to the starboard side. Excitement mounts as we approach port and drop anchor. It is incredible! We have reached our first port of call - we are graduates!

Now, as we review the log-book of our journey, we realize how many people we have to thank. First, the Director and Faculty of our School of Nursing who have instilled in us sound nursing principles; then all members of the medical and hospital staff who have aided us to make practical application of our knowledge. We are also grateful to all patients who have made the process of learning a pleasurable experience. Yet, foremost in our hearts tonight we place our dear parents - for it is they who have steered us through the many squalls and who, when the tide of desire ebbed, renewed our courage and gave us strength to continue our journey.

And now that we have reached our goal, what does the future hold? We face new and wonderful experiences - there are many ports of call ahead. We must take our bearings, chart new courses and set sail for those far-off shores. We aspire to be a first class crew on the ship of progress. We must aim to use skill and training to the best of our ability, otherwise we shall flounder or run aground. The well-being of patients and our own happiness lie in personal fulfilment and this fulfilment will be reached only when we have realized our potentialities to the fullest degree. Again, in the words of Dag Hammarskjöld:

"Never look down to test the ground before taking your next step: only he who keeps his eye fixed on the far horizon will find his right road."

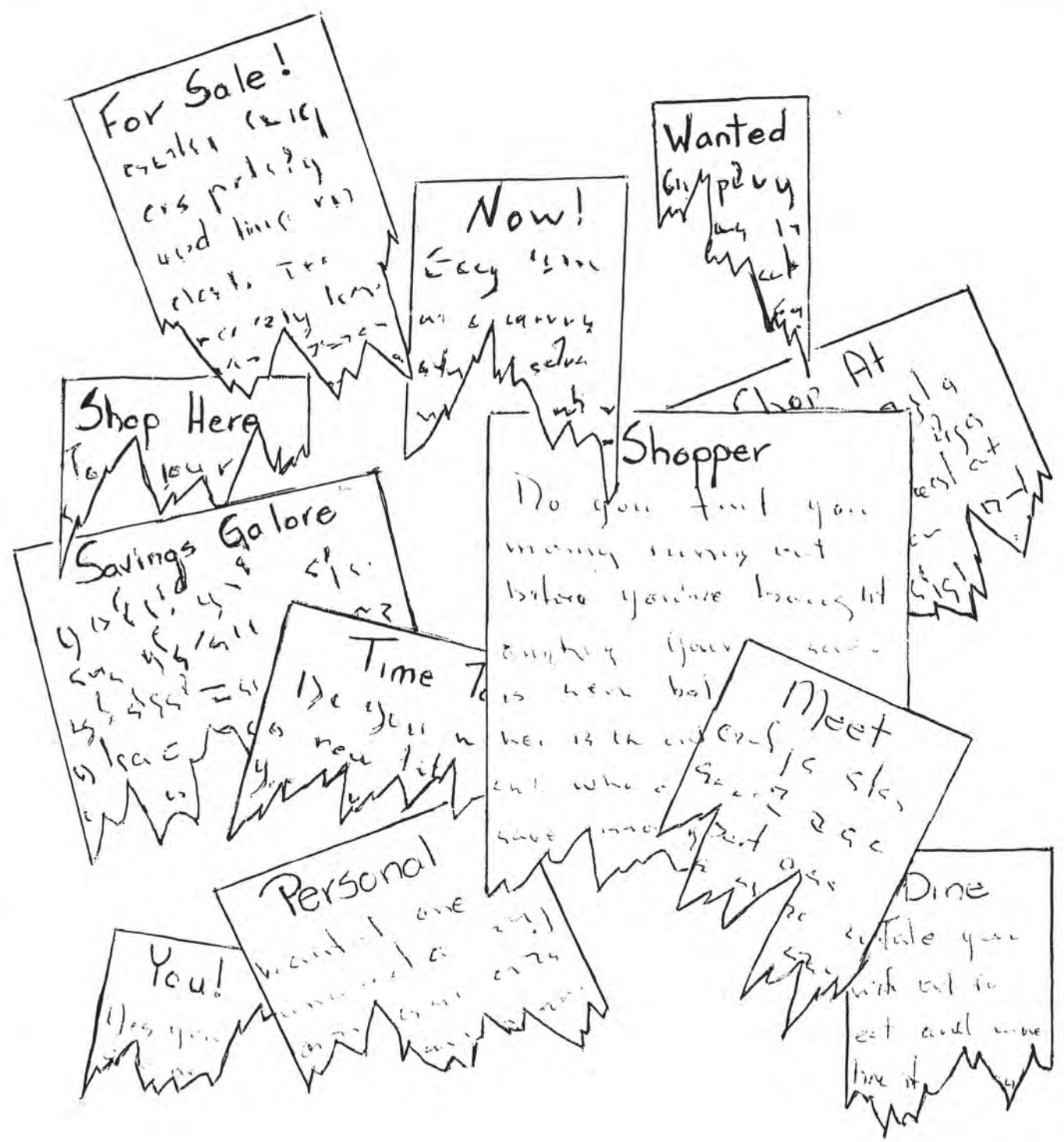

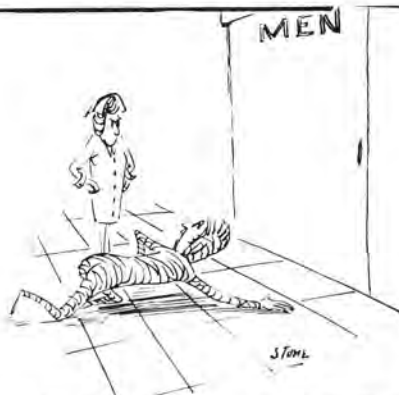

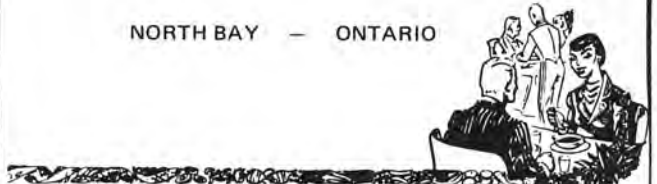
