




Editorial



Graduation . . . a dream

... a swift reality

... then ... the penumbra of a memory.

Graduation was a dream. Three years ago, we entred the Marymount School of Nursing to acquire a knowledge of the moral, spiritual, practical and scientific care of the sick. . . . that a smile 'Laughter's Whisper' and a ready assistance could lift a heavy heart and ease an anxious mind.

Did you know that a student nurse making a bed for the first time has five thumbs on each hand? We knew!

Our classmates have played a necessary role in our nursing achievements. $\,$

"When we travel hand in hand The way is paved with smiles Many ruts are taken from The long and weary miles."

We have found nothing better to keep a class working together than the class itself. A Unity of Endeavour is most rewarding. Together we have attempted to "Serve the Lord with Joy" in evidence that "No other Love could warm our hearts."

The emotional attachments, so evident today, have a tendency to slip into the past. The persistent links, those made of faith, supported by hope, and united by Divine Love, should and need never be broken. Each one's silence, laughter, and encouragement will long be remembered.

We hope that qualities of warmth, sincerity and true Christian charity have permeated our activities here and will continue to do so. This life of service proclaims that Jesus, the Healer, still lives in us and through us. Our love and God's love mutually dwell in the temple of our hearts. This is the seed that can permeate our being.

As Christ received His Father's Love and with this love effected God's design so we too, can complete this design. Just as the true Christian strives naturally toward the good and the truth and lives up to God's Commandments so, we, as Christian Nurses, if we open ourselves to the Divine Physician, strive naturally towards the standards that have shown us these past three years.

More than ever, this day, we realize that a student develops as a Nurse only as she develops as a person. We look back gratefully on experiences because of the realization that they have helped us become mature, responsible, thinking young women.

Graduation . . . a swift reality -

Now that our previous goal is an actuality, our hearts are filled with one of the greatest happiness' we have ever known.

It is a reality but it must be more than the culmination of three years, more than a chronological fulfillment. It must be an Epiphany — a manifestation — Yes, a reality, but not because we can see that the colour of our bands has changed from blue to grey and now to black, but because we can see the significance of these past three years, because we can see what standards we should strive for tomorrow. Today, then, is a cognitio in our drama of existence.

Years ago, the nurse to us was glamorous and heroic — a Florence Nightingale — in her starched white uniform and cap with its black band. This same cap with its coveted marking has come to mean so much more to us. Beneath this band, we earnestly seek to find and to maintain a mind, with which to think, a heart whose pulse gives life, and a body whose hands and feet carry out the dictates of mind and heart.

All this joy and sense of accomplishment could not have been possible without you.

To Sister Jane Frances, our Administrator, and to the Sisters of St. Joseph, we owe gratitude unending. You had the task of making nurses out of high school students and women out of girls.

It is difficult to find words that will convey our deep sentiments of gratitude to our Director of Nursing, Sister St. Louis. May we say that we will always have with us the happy memory of your loyal, zealous competency. You have been a guide to perfection and most of all, a Friend.

Our Teachers, Head Nurses and Graduate Nurses, we thank you for the guidance you gave us; for the wisdom, gained by experience, which you shared with us and for the patience you displayed with us.

To the Doctors who tolerated us in our ignorance, corrected us in our mistakes and who encouraged us to perfect our skills, we thank you today.

Taking this opportunity, I would like to express our appreciation to our Housemothers who "bore with us" for three long years. Our teen-age ambivalence must have been the cause of much wonderment, concern and patience for you. We are grateful for your understanding.

Mom . . . Dad . . . the unsung heroes of our lives, who restore confidence, offer encouragement and deflate swelled heads in their special way. You displayed love for us countless times; you were proud of us in our triumphs; you were anxious with us on our "first days". How well you offer the tangibles and intangibles of love! You have been perfect guardians of the life you created together, showing us always that charity is not selective but that it embraces all mankind. We pray that our children someday will be as proud of us as we are of you. May we repay you by being the kind of Nurse you would want us to be.

1962, in our minds described the future as a mountain top obscured by mist. Now, as this year slips over the horizon, let us look forward with courage to our new fields of endeavour.

May we continue to be stimulated by the challenges of Nursing and of Life remembering that . . .

"This earth is one vast hospital, a synthesis of pain."

Each graduate will be master of her own destiny! In common, however, we must maintain a high level of personal integrity, moral character, devotion to duty and trust in God.

As the members of this class reflect on Graduation Day, may we be reminded of the goals we have set for ourselves today.

Will the light of this epiphany delineate into a mere shadow?

Will what we hope and feel today, become a dim reflection tomorrow?

Will the fiery zeal fade into a dying ember or even an ash?

Will we become part of the inanimate structure of a hospital?

These are the questions which may haunt us tomorrow! Lack of motivation is a threat to our ideals today! The path we choose . . . whether it be Detoriation or Perfection . . . determines the goal which is finally ours.

May our future in nursing be enlightened by the glow provided on this Graduation Day — and may this light of hope, no matter how threatened by the winds of mediocrity and carelessness, be a beacon to urge us on to even greater challenges in the nursing profession.
