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



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

#### Mission Statement

St Vincent's Hospital (1992)

Rooted in the Judaeo-Christian values and tradition of the Sisters of Charity of the Immaculate Conception, we of St. Vincent's Health Care Society subscribe to a philosophy of reverence and respect for the inherent natural and spiritual dignity of all people.

We hold that the dignity of each individual must be recognized at every stage of life and that reverence for life be extended to every human being from conception, through death, to eternal life without regard to race, colour, religion, ancestry or place of origin, sex, age or social status.

In particular, St. Vincent's Health Care Society is committed to working in partnership with Family Practice Physicians, Specialists, and other Health Care Providers to deliver competent, compassionate continuity of care to adult patients.

This commitment shall see the Health Care Society enhance services to adults of advancing years by facilitating delivery of care in the most appropriate community environment. These services shall include acute inpatient, extended care and ambulatory programs as well as outreach programs to form bridges between hospital and homes.

The Health Care Society shall coordinate with and provide a resource for community health services to enable delivery of care in the home wherever possible. These services are to be complementary to those offered by the major tertiary teaching hospitals and other health agencies.

We hold that the work done by all staff members of our Health Care Society is praiseworthy and essential. All should take personal pride and satisfaction in their work as members of our health care team through which a vital contribution is made to the physical, psychological, social and spiritual wellbeing of our patients, residents and their families.

SISTER LORETTO SUGGESTED THAT THE HOSPITAL, WHEN IT OPENED, HAD A POLICY OF TAKING A "DEEP, PERSONAL INTEREST" IN EACH PATIENT. "EACH EMPLOYEE FEELS PART OF THE HOSPITAL, from the chief surgeon to the dishwasher in the kitchen. 



Sister MacDonald herself was responsible for many changes, from leading the way towards a regional laundry to establishing the first ICU in Vancouver. This hospital has shown more courage in the face of change than any other establishment I have encountered. My involvement and participation in the world of St. Vincent's Hospital started in the early fifties and has continued up to the present. Initially, St. Vincent's functioned as a community hospital with a full spectrum of general services, including pediatrics and obstetrics, but there have been many significant changes over the years. With the development of vaccines and antibiotics, hospital stays for children became increasingly infrequent. Gradually, the pediatric wards emptied. At the same time, maternity care improved and the need for appropriate levels of regional obstetrical care became apparent. Accordingly, in 1974 it was agreed that the obstetrical services should be transferred to one of the referral hospitals – a necessary, albeit melancholy decision. During this era, St. Vincent's recognized the need to develop an adult medico-surgical intensive care unit. This unit was the first of its kind to open in the city. It also became apparent that there was a pressing need for additional intermediate and extended care facilities in Vancouver. Consequently, five subsidiary long-term care units joined St. Vincent's. St. Vincent's is noteworthy for obvious reasons, but its true distinguishing characteristics are the camaraderie and support of the medical, nursing and hospital personnel, and the caring atmosphere instilled by the Sisters of Charity. 

She rushed to the window And there she quickly found That a psychiatric patient Had landed on the ground.









Once, when I was on duty as night supervisor in Emergency, a woman came to the door with a cat she'd found lying in the road a few blocks away. The cat was obviously dead, but the woman desperately wanted us to resuscitate it. We started to explain that we would do what we could, but then decided it would be better to get the night duty physician to "examine" the animal and then break the news to the woman. When all was said and done, we were stuck with the predicament of what to do with this cat body. I phoned the S.P.C.A emergency line, but was told simply to put the cat in a cardboard box and place it outside where someone would pick it up "sometime" the next morning. I didn't think this would be very welcoming to patients entering the hospital, so I decided instead to put the animal in a green garbage bag, label it "CAT," and store it in the morgue. Another call to the S.P.C.A assured me that the cat would definitely be collected before my shift ended, which it was. However, as I was reporting to the Director of Nursing the following day, she pointedly asked, "What about the cat in the morgue?" You just can't hide anything. Someone always finds out. I met John Forrester at a dinner party one Christmas, and the topic arose that I'd been doing public relations for one of the ministries in Victoria, which I found rather disheartening. 



The on-call doctor and other Sisters were already in the room with her, and the doctor told us she had to be admitted. On checking with the Nursing Unit, we were informed that there was a staffing problem and a number of the beds were closed. Within a matter of minutes, a nurse said she would contact the senior leader on-call and ask that a bed be opened. The nurse noted that the other option was to transfer the Sister to St. Paul's, where she would likely stay in the Emergency Department all night if not longer. I set out to contact a private duty nurse, but was immediately informed that one of the staff nurses would be more than happy to nurse the Sister for the night. On checking in on her in the morning, I was informed that the Sister needed constant care, which the attending nurse was delighted to provide. 




